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



Mr. Robert Gray Awarded Archdiocese's Excellence in Education Award

Beloved Saint Peter School teacher Mr. Robert Gray was chosen to receive the prestigious Excellence in Education Award from the Archdiocese of Boston for 2019–2020. Cardinal Sean O'Malley named Mr. Gray a winner of the award during a special web call last April. He is the Grade 7 and Grade 8 Math and Religion Teacher.

Given to ten elementary and five high school teachers across the Archdiocese, the Excellence in Education Award “honors elementary and secondary school teachers' commitment to developing saint and scholars.” As Superintendent of Catholic Schools for the Archdiocese of Boston Thomas Carroll explained in his announcement of the award, parents, administrators, students, and peers nominate teachers for “their strong leadership qualities, Catholic values, academic excellence, and their commitment to their students as well as school.”

Fellow Saint Peter School faculty members praise Mr. Gray's innovative spirit, willingness to collaborate, and dedication to students. He has been at Saint Peter's since 2001, when he followed his heart into teaching after retiring early from a highly successful career at Gillette. Admired by students in and out of the classroom, Mr. Gray has coached numerous CYO basketball teams and encouraged many students to participate in after-school soccer and running clubs that he started. He stays in touch

with scores of former students, systematically keeping track and proudly boasting of their college acceptances and other academic and career accomplishments. Alumni from throughout his years at Saint Peter's return to the school to visit with the teaching and storytelling virtuoso himself, hoping to once again be treated to a “Mr. Gray story.”

With boundless pride and appreciation Saint Peter School honors Robert Gray for his 2019–2020 Excellence in Education Award. SPS Zoomed into Remote Learning last Spring

The Saint Peter School community began March with students and faculty experiencing typical anticipation for spring's familiar rituals such as Easter, April vacation, First Holy Communion, class trips, Field Day, and Graduation. But it was soon apparent that this spring—indeed, this year—would be like no other as Saint Peter's tackled the unforeseen challenges of the coronavirus outbreak by quickly and effectively transitioning to remote learning.

Early in the month Saint Peter School Administrator and Superintendent of Catholic Schools for the Archdiocese of Boston Thomas Carroll appointed Beth Adams, Grade 7 and 8 ELA Teacher, and Ashley Davis, Middle School Science Teacher, as Interim Co-Principals. Together with the Superintendent, they announced plans to close the school for a thorough cleaning from Friday, March 13 to Monday, March 16. However, the initial two-day closure was quickly expanded in the wake of Massachusetts Governor Charles Baker's decision to close all schools in the commonwealth, public and private, through April 6. That order was soon expanded to May 4; before long, it was clear that Saint Peter students and their Massachusetts cohorts would complete the school year at home.

Led by the Interim Co-Principals, Saint Peter faculty and staff created a remote learning contingency plan so that the teaching goals of the year could continue to be achieved. Thanks to the generous technology gift of \$30,000 from an anonymous donor in the fall of 2019, the school was able to send students home with Chromebooks so that teachers could immediately begin to deliver lessons online. Despite the challenges for students, teachers, and parents, many of whom were now overseeing their children's distance learning from home, the shift to virtual classrooms was successful. Teachers appreciated the invaluable work of parents in guiding and monitoring students' work, and parents were grateful for the teachers' unshakable commitment to adhering to lesson plans, remaining connected to each student, and providing numerous and creative opportunities for students to be engaged with each other while learning remotely. And everyone was encouraged by students' adaptability and good cheer!

During this time, the Interim Co-Principals, Leadership Team, and teachers frequently met remotely to monitor progress, constantly seeking feedback and updating families regarding the changing situation. Working with the Catholic Schools Office, they surveyed parents via a questionnaire, which provided helpful comments and an overall positive report.

Not long after the switch to remote learning, teachers concluded that students should be graded Past/Fail for the final trimester;

the challenges of learning remotely, as well as the difficulties of assessing student performance online, were too great to do otherwise. Teachers also assured families that students would not be penalized should circumstances prevent them from completing assignments.

Like classroom instruction, many events were moved online. Beginning with the reimagined *Dare to Dream Gala and Auction*, which grossed \$130,000 (please see story on page 14), remote school events included a weeklong virtual field trip, a cooking class with Chef Doug, Trivia Night, Bingo Night, spirit week, a virtual Parent Association meeting, Virtual Grade 8 Graduation, and Virtual K1 and K2 Graduation.

A welcome good news story of the spring: In April Saint Peter’s learned that its very own Robert Gray, Grade 7 and 8 Math and Religion Teacher, was named a recipient of the Archdiocese of Boston Excellence in Education Award. Honoring ten elementary school and five school high teachers in Catholic schools of the Archdiocese, the award recognizes teachers’ commitment to developing their students as saints and scholars (please see story on page 3).

Also in April, Superintendent Carroll appointed a principal search committee to interview and recommend exceptional principal candidates forwarded by the Catholic Schools Office. After a thorough search, the Superintendent announced the appointment of Patrick Boyden as the new principal of Saint Peter School. Although his official start date was July 1, 2020, Principal-select Boyden immediately immersed himself in school matters, assisting with ongoing enrollment efforts and budgeting exercises, and hosting a series of coffee chats and conversation hours to get to know the community. In addition, drawing

from parents, faculty, and staff, he organized Saint Peter’s own COVID-19 Response Team, consisting of medical personnel, administrators, scientists, and janitors. The school year concluded with virtual graduations and goodbye wishes expressed via Zoom. Families were able to drive by and collect students’ belongings that had been left in classrooms back in mid-March, well before anyone knew how severely the pandemic would cut short in-person learning for 2019–2020. This unusual concluding rite was enabled by the teachers, who illustrated yet again their spectacular devotion to their students and the school. Quite simply, the teachers—this year’s

Meeting the daunting circumstances of the pandemic required uncommon resilience, collaboration, and energy on the part of the entire Saint Peter community—everyone rose to the occasion. We are enormously proud that during this most challenging chapter in Saint Peter School’s history, it sustained its high standards of excellence, remarkable ability to innovate, and indefatigable spirit. Together with family, faculty, and friends, the Class of 2020 celebrated a special and memorable Virtual Graduation, organized by Interim Co-Principal and Grade 8 teacher *extraordinaire* Mrs. Beth Adams.

Most impressive was the class's response to the cancelation of their trip. Like 8th grade classes before them, the Class of 2020 raised money for their trip throughout the year. After learning that they wouldn't be heading to Washington, the class decided to redirect what they raised to fund two gifts to Saint Peter's. They donated a wooden "buddy bench," a welcome addition to the outdoor space there they had played as kindergarten students and a wonderful reminder of their beloved K1 and K2 buddies. And thanks to

Grade 8 students and families, Saint Peter School has a new fund for financial aid, **The Stronger Together Scholarship**, a \$500 award, given to a rising 8th grader chosen on the basis of merit and financial need. The Delino family legacy cherishes learning and those who facilitate it. Kenny fondly recalls many of Mr. Robert Gray's stories, interspersed among math and religion classes. And Kenny continues to hold dear Mr. Gray's sound advice.

Like many of his peers, Kenny found himself calling upon reserves of resilience during this difficult time of the coronavirus. Please read his words on what he has learned these last few months and how his Saint Peter School experience has continued to shape him throughout his educational journey.

The recent pandemic has plagued the world dearly, and we have all been left with nothing but time on our hands while we attempt to adjust our lives to our new reality. My world was changed significantly on March 11th, 2020 when my senior year at Boston College was cut short due to the coronavirus. I remember vividly sitting in my French Caribbean Environmental class when the BC administration sent out an email informing all students that we would have to leave campus and have to finish the spring semester online. I walked back to my dorm knowing that I only had four days to attempt to bring myself a sense of closure as I knew my wonderful time at BC would be ending earlier than anticipated. In that moment, there were too many emotions that

ran through my head. I was thinking about my graduation, friends and family, my grandmother, and a plethora of other things. It felt as if my entire world was being taken away from me, and when I moved out of my dorm and back to my home, those feelings were confirmed.

It is safe to assume that we all felt an unspiraling of some sort whether that be physically, mentally, spiritually, or even a combination of the three. I look to one moment that truly helped me get through those treacherous spring months, and that moment was a phone call I made to two former Saint Peter's classmates of mine, Kendrick Bellan and Lupita Acevedo. We spent hours on the phone talking about the state of the world amidst the coronavirus, talking about our different high school experiences, reminiscing about old memories, and laughing. Kendrick, Lupita, and I had gone from K2 all the way through the eighth grade together. Although we all went to different high schools and colleges, we had always maintained contact

with each other and still do. Therefore, for me, it was second nature to just call them and check in. However, what made this phone call special was the fact that it was the first time I realized the gift of Saint Peter's School. It's a place where relationships are made and developed from a young age, and these relationships have a chance to last a lifetime. More importantly, it is a place where lessons, both big and small, are learned. I still hear Mr. Gray telling (more so yelling) at me to say, "excuse me" instead of "what?", or "pardon me" instead of "hub?" The lessons I have learned from Saint Peter's School always stayed with me and forever will. Therefore, when I think about the way I ended my time at BC and life in this pandemic, I think with hope because I know the fundamental principles I have taken from these experiences will be of good use to me one day. Even when I am a little bit off path, I know that Lupita and Kendrick will be there for me or Mr. Gray's voice will pop into my head. Saint Peter's is a place full of richness, and these riches come in the form of people, moments, and lessons. Some stay with Saint Peter's a lifetime and some stay for only a year or two. No matter the length of time a child or parent is with the Saint Peter's community, there will definitely be a moment of richness for them that will carry them a long way. For me, that is the beauty of Saint Peter's School.

No doubt other alumni recognize their own Saint Peter School experience in Kenny Delino's words. We are grateful to him for sharing his story and partnering with Saint Peter School in this special way. Thank you, Kenny, for being part of a great tradition!

We are grateful for this deep tradition of care and generosity.

The coronavirus crisis has challenged Saint Peter's fundraising efforts while rendering them more important than ever. Although forced to cancel last spring's golf tournament and this fall's Oktoberfest, we shifted to a *Virtual Gala and Auction* and conducted a Virtual Fall 5K, both of which were highly successful. Yet our financial needs have increased dramatically as we continue to mount an effective response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Accordingly, in 2020–2021 the *Saint Peter Cares Annual Fund* seeks to raise \$450,000 to meet the operating expenses of an ordinary year and to cover the costs related to this extraordinary year. Since the spring, faculty and parents have devoted unparalleled energy and expertise to determining and securing the protocols, equipment, and services essential to Saint Peter's ability to open and remain open for in-person learning. These measures, indispensable yet expensive, include thorough and frequent cleanings, upgraded technology, abundant PPE, and regular testing of students and faculty.

Most notably, the testing program is costly; the fees paid by parents will not cover all expenses. A remarkable donor has anonymously provided a \$50,000 gift to match contributions earmarked for the testing program—and which has jump-started this initiative! We hope for widespread support from the greater school community. Respectfully, we ask all parents to make a gift that is meaningful

to them. Every donation to the Saint Peter School Cares Annual Fund is invaluable and welcome!

On a personal note, my family's love for Saint Peter School runs deep. My husband and I are beyond grateful for the first-hand benefits of the stable foundation Catholic education provided to our daughter, a 2014 Saint Peter School alumna and a junior at Connecticut College. My family witnessed firsthand Saint Peter's welcoming atmosphere and multicultural educational environment. Onto my third year as the Director of Advancement, I enjoy getting to know members of the faculty, staff, and administration, multitude of parents I've met through the years serving on the board and volunteering. I am beyond grateful for all the wonderful parents we have willing to volunteer at events.

Thank you for your support, which fortifies our response to these difficult days and strengthens this wonderful community of faith, care, and joy.

Last March, as the coronavirus outbreak rapidly upended daily life, the Saint Peter School community quickly galvanized to reimagine the *Dare to Dream Gala and Auction*, then less than two weeks away. Although we were disappointed that we were unable to gather in person, the event provided great flexibility for participants who were overseeing their children’s distance learning, working from home, and learning to manage life amidst a pandemic. An anonymous donor generously offered to match donation proceeds from the virtual bids and buys, up to \$30,000, which terrifically kickstarted the auction and helped to guarantee impressive results.

Highlights included the video created for the gala that showcased Saint Peter’s students—coordinated by parents Alicia Bard, Wendy Burns, and Rebecca Susi—and the singing talents of Penny Vincent from Grade 3, SPS Teachers Julie Songer and Mark Smith. Another popular feature: the video of 2020 Saint Peter School Fund-A-Need for Tuition Scholarship’s guest speaker, Cameron Monagle ’11, who movingly spoke of his educational journey that began at Saint Peter School. His heartfelt words inspired the many parents and friends who contributed to the Fund-A-Need Scholarship, which helps Saint Peter’s provide a superb faith-based and academically rigorous education to all students, regardless of their ability to pay.

The sensational fundraising total and immense goodwill generated by the Virtual Auction lifted spirits at a time of uncommon upheaval. *Thank you to everyone in our community who came together during a difficult time to support the school.* We are deeply grateful for the spectacular team of volunteers and room parents whose extraordinary efforts, sharing of talents, and good spirits pulled off Saint Peter’s first virtual fundraiser.

Saint Peter School's Successful Reopening

When Governor Baker made the difficult but essential decision to close schools in March 2020, Saint Peter School immediately started planning for a safe reopening this Fall. Re-entry became the top priority for Principal-select Patrick Boyden. Appointed in April by Superintendent of Schools for the Archdiocese of Boston Thomas W. Carroll, Principal Boyden immediately plunged into the work required for a September return to Concord Avenue.

Well before his official start date in July, Principal Boyden concentrated on enrollment efforts. In the Spring, many families, concerned by the uncertainty surrounding COVID-19 and its effects on school-aged children, understandably took extra time to consider their plans for the new school year. Principal Boyden and Mark Smith, our Director of Admissions, collaborated with teachers and parents to launch a comprehensive outreach initiative, following up with both current and prospective families. Their efforts paid off and the school exceeded its enrollment targets. There continues to be strong interest in Saint Peter and, due to COVID-19 space restrictions, the school has established a waiting list. Many of our classrooms are at their max capacity, given the state's physical distancing guidelines!

To assist with the re-entry plans, and to ensure that our strategy was both compliant with state guidelines and responsive to Saint Peter's unique context, Principal Boyden

established an internal Task Force to collaborate closely with three parent consulting subcommittees:

- **Scientific Review Subcommittee:** Consisting of parents with experience and expertise in medicine, healthcare, and scientific research, this subcommittee ensured that the school's reopening strategy was responsive to the latest COVID-19 research, medical realities, and public health considerations.
- **Operations Subcommittee:** Composed of parents with experience and expertise in management, operations, and logistics, this subcommittee ensured that the myriad new and updated school systems and procedures were efficient, safe, and not overly burdensome for SPS students, staff, and parents.
- **Community Culture Subcommittee:** This subcommittee ensured that, despite the many operational changes needed to keep our community safe, the school year is joy-filled for our students, staff, and parents.

As the summer progressed, Principal Boyden hosted virtual town halls with the broader parent community and gained valuable feedback and input. He also directed the creation of a "Reopening Updates" page on the Saint Peter School website, with important information, recommendations, and directives from the Center for Disease Control, the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, and other relevant

authorities. In addition, at the end of August, the Scientific Review Subcommittee hosted a virtual panel presentation for parents to introduce our comprehensive reopening safety measures that details new policies for arrival and dismissal, snack and lunch, and even recess!

Most importantly, parents also learned of Saint Peter School's COVID-19 Response Protocol for if/when a positive case is identified in the community, which calls for a grade to pivot to remote instruction for two weeks, if there is a confirmed case of the virus within the class. During that time, students and teachers will follow a special "Remote Pivot Schedule," which adheres to the school's in-person schedule and allows other grades to continue in-person learning.

Before school opened, Saint Peter's made another key investment in its technology, thanks to generous benefactors. To optimize learning for ill students who must be at home while their classmates are learning in-person, Saint Peter School contracted with CommLink Integration to outfit all classrooms with basic livestreaming technology, allowing absent students to "Zoom" into daily lessons. While livestreaming is not a fully robust remote experience, nor is it equivalent to in-person learning, it does allow homebound students to engage meaningfully with their teachers and classmates.

On September 1, teachers and administrators returned to the school for professional development and final preparations for the opening day of school, one week away. Throughout the jam-packed week, the team participated in sessions on a variety of topics, including school health and safety, student engagement during online learning, institutional racism in America, and Google Classroom.

Masked and equipped with hand sanitizers, Saint Peter School students in Grades 1–8 returned for in-person learning on September 8, with K1 and K2 welcomed on the 9th. The school day was shortened during the first week, giving students and teachers critical time to adjust and familiarize themselves with new policies and procedures. It also allowed the school to address operational issues to maximize community safety. Thanks to the support, counsel, and unending hard work of all teachers, staff, and parents, as well as the cooperation of the students, Saint Peter School resumed full-time, five day a week in-person learning on September 14.

With the goal of reopening the school achieved, the focus shifted to ensuring that Saint Peter's safely *remains* open. Along with monitoring strict adherence to the new safety policies and procedures, the school instituted weekly COVID-19 testing. Principal Boyden established a partnership with Cataldo Ambulance to administer the tests, the Cambridge Innovation Center to provide testing materials and logistics, and the Broad Institute to analyze test samples and provide results. This innovative initiative is similar to the programs that leading educational institutions, such as

Harvard and MIT, have launched to keep their communities healthy. As of this writing, no other Archdiocesan school offers student testing and this degree of safety and security to its community. With weekly surveillance testing, Saint Peter's can proactively identify and isolate any positive cases, minimizing the risk that the entire school would need to shut down due to an outbreak.

Saint Peter School remains vigilant in its efforts to ensure the safety, health, and emotional well-being of the students and staff. 2020–2021's fundraising goals reflect the need for funds to cover our heightened safety measures, which are necessary but costly. We made the advisable decision to allocate a significant portion of this year's operating budget to COVID-19 related expenses and protections. This year's annual fundraising appeal, the Saint Peter Cares Annual Fund, seeks to raise \$450,000, with \$150,000 specifically earmarked to defray the expenses of weekly testing (those unmet by the fees that families pay), classroom technology upgrades, PPE, and increased custodial and sanitation needs. An anonymous generous donor contributed \$50,000 to match contributions designated for testing, wonderfully jump-starting our Annual Fund. We encourage and welcome all members of our community to demonstrate their support of Saint Peter's by donating to the *Saint Peter Cares Annual Fund*. Every gift is greatly appreciated!

As the school year has progressed, practices such as mask-wearing, physical distancing, grade-level cohorting, and eating lunch in the classroom, once awkward, are now routine. The students' joyful energy inspires all at Saint Peter's and underscores the inestimable value of on-campus learning and in-person interaction. As Peter said to Jesus, "Lord, it is good that we are here." (Matthew 17:4) It is, indeed, good for everyone to be back, further illuminating the Light on the Hill. Thank you to Principal Boyden, teachers and all staff, parents, and friends who have made it possible.

May our Blessed Mother and Saint Peter, our patron, continue to protect us.




